Management's Discussion and Analysis of Financial Condition and Results of Operations For the year ended December 31, 2023

The following is management's discussion and analysis ("MD&A") of the results and financial condition of Oceanic Iron Ore Corp. ("Oceanic" or the "Company") and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying audited consolidated financial statements and related notes for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022 (the "Annual Financial Statements"). The Annual Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IFRS"). All figures are reported in Canadian dollars unless otherwise indicated.

Certain information included in this discussion may constitute forward looking statements. Forward looking statements are based on current expectations and entail various risks and uncertainties. These risks and uncertainties could cause or contribute to actual results that are materially different from those expressed or implied. Please see the section entitled "Forward Looking Statements" of this document for further detail on forward looking statements. The effective date of this report is April 25, 2024.

Description of Business

The Company was incorporated on March 8, 1986 under the British Columbia Business Corporations Act. Its common shares are traded on the TSX Venture Exchange (the "TSXV") under the symbol "FEO".

The Company is focused on the exploration and development of the Ungava Bay iron properties (the "Property") in Nunavik, Québec, which the Company acquired in November 2010. The Property comprises three project areas: Hopes Advance (also referred to as the "Project" throughout), Morgan Lake and Roberts Lake, which cover over 35,264 hectares and 844 claim cells with iron ore formations and are located within 20 to 50 km from tidewater. The Company has a 100% interest, subject to a 2% net smelter returns royalty ("NSR") in the Property. The Company's two NSR holders are each entitled to annual advance NSR payments of \$100,000 until the commencement of commercial production on the Company's Hopes Advance Project. Advanced royalty payments are deductible from actual royalty payments subsequent to the commencement of commercial production.

In December 2019, the Company announced the results of a revised and re-scoped National Instrument 43-101 Preliminary Economic Assessment in respect of the Company's Hopes Advance Project (the "Study"). The objective of the Study was to rescope the Project profile and production scale using Measured and Indicated Mineral Resources estimated within three of the ten defined deposits from Hopes Advance in order to reduce the up-front capital required to bring the Project to commercial production. The Company continues to pursue a number of options to improve its financial capacity, including securing a strategic partner to further advance the Hopes Advance project, and obtaining cash flow through other forms of financing. The success of raising such funds cannot be assured.

Qualified Person

Eddy Canova, P.Geo., OGQ(403), a Qualified Person as defined by NI 43-101, has reviewed and is responsible for the technical information contained in this document.

Highlights and key business developments

On December 12, 2023, the Company settled \$50,000 of its 2023 advance royalty payment of \$100,000 payable to 154619 Canada Inc. ("154619") through a cash payment of \$50,000, with the remaining \$50,000 having been agreed to be deferred until November 30, 2024. On December 12, 2023, the Company settled its 2023 advance royalty payment of \$100,000 payable to SPG Royalties Inc. ("SPG") through a cash payment of \$25,000 and through the issuance of 1,153,846 common shares of the Company, at a price of \$0.065 per common share.

On November 29, 2023, the Company entered into an agreement with the holder of the previously issued Series B Debenture (the "Previous Series B Debenture") to replace the Previous Series B Debenture with

a new debenture (the "Series B Debenture"), maturing on November 29, 2028. The Previous Series B Debenture was convertible into units at a conversion price of \$0.10 per unit. Each unit was comprised of one common share and one share purchase warrant exercisable into one common share of the Company at a price of \$0.05 per common share. The Previous Series B Debenture bore interest at 8.5% per annum over a five-year term.

The terms of the Series B Debenture are the same as the Previous Series B Debenture, other than (i) the warrant exercise price is \$0.07 per common share and (ii) the maturity date is November 29, 2028.

The most significant factors affecting the change in net (loss) income for the periods presented included:

(Loss) gain on change in fair value of derivative liabilities and accretion expense

The derivative liabilities of the Company are carried at fair value, which fair value is derived by the use of binomial option pricing models. During FY 2023, the Company's share price decreased from the beginning of the year compared to the end of the year resulting in a gain on the non-cash derivative liability associated with the debentures. The loss on the non-cash derivative liabilities in Q4 2023 is primarily a result of the recognition of the Series B Debenture and the associated extension of the maturity date, which was partially offset by a reduction in the share price from the beginning of the quarter to the end of the quarter.

Accretion expense for Q4 2023 and FY 2023 increased by \$3,621 and \$84,826, respectively, compared to Q4 2022 and FY 2022 primarily due to the addition of the Series D Debentures issued during September 2022.

Professional fees

Professional fees for Q4 2023 and FY 2023 decreased by \$45,256 and \$69,125, respectively, compared to Q4 2022 and FY 2022 due to a decrease in audit and legal fees combined with the capitalization of transaction costs associated with the Series B Debenture.

Share-based compensation

Share-based compensation for Q4 2023 and FY 2023 increased by \$28,204 and \$58,882, respectively, compared to Q4 2022 and FY 2022 due to a stock option grant of 1,540,000 stock options in FY 2023 compared to nil stock options granted in FY 2022.

As the Company has yet make a development decision or achieve commercial production from its mineral asset, the Company has no revenue to report during the financial reporting periods noted above, nor has the Company declared any dividends in the past three fiscal years.

Effective January 1, 2023, compensation for the Company's Chief Financial Officer was reported within consulting and management fees (previously reported within wages and benefits) on the consolidated statements of income (loss) and comprehensive income (loss).

As demonstrated in the above table, the differences in net income (loss) from one quarter to another is predominantly due to the non-cash losses or gains recognized on the fair value adjustments to the embedded derivative liability component contained in the convertible debentures. The Company uses binomial option pricing models to value the embedded derivative component of the convertible debentures which relies on a combination of observable and unobservable market inputs (including changes in the Company's share price from one period-end to another).

Fluctuations in loss from operations correlate largely with changes in the amount of share-based compensation recognized in any particular period. The amount of share-based compensation varies predominantly based on (i) the number of stock options granted during a fiscal year and (ii) the price of the Company's common shares at the grant date.

Liquidity, Capital Resources and Going Concern

While the Annual Financial Statements have been prepared on the basis that the Company will continue as a going concern, which contemplates the realization of assets and settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business as they come due, certain conditions and events result in a material uncertainty casting significant doubt on the validity of this assumption. For the year ended December 31, 2023, the Company had an accumulated deficit of \$33,871,487, and a working capital deficit of \$841,766.

While the Company completed a non-brokered private placement in the amount of \$1,220,000 by way of issuance of the Series D Debentures during FY 2022, and also successfully replaced its previously issued Series B Debenture with a maturity date of November 29, 2023, with a new Series B Debenture that matures on November 29, 2028, the Company's ability to continue on a going concern basis for and beyond the next twelve months depends on its ability to successfully raise additional financing for continued operations and for the necessary capital expenditures required to achieve planned principal operations. The Company continues to pursue a number of options to improve its financial capacity, including securing a strategic partner to further advance the Hopes Advance project. While the Company has been successful in the past in obtaining financing, there is no assurance that it will be able to obtain adequate financing in the future or that such financing will be on terms acceptable to the Company.

Factors that could affect the availability of financing include the Company's performance, the state of international debt and equity markets, investor perceptions and expectations, the retention of key executive management and the state of global financial and metals markets.

Additionally, in order to maintain current rights of tenure to exploration tenements, the Company is required to incur minimal expenditures of \$73,257 in respect of claim renewal fees and minimum work requirements during 2024.

As at December 31, 2023, the convertible debentures and non-cash embedded derivative liabilities have a combined carrying value of \$3,449,747, representing the discounted face value of the debentures of \$3,436,872, fair value of the non-cash embedded derivative liability of \$2,345,896, partially offset by a deferred loss balance of \$2,333,021.

The total future cash outflows associated with the repayment of the principal of the Series A Debentures (\$760,000), Series B Debenture (\$837,500), Series C Debentures (\$1,557,548) and Series D Debentures (\$1,205,000) cannot exceed the combined amount of principal of \$4,360,048 plus any accrued interest.

Interest associated with the debentures above can be settled in cash or common shares quarterly at the election of the Company.

On January 3, 2023, the Company elected to settle \$94,107 in accrued interest payable under the Company's previously issued convertible debentures through the issuance of 1,344,374 common shares of the Company, at a price of \$0.07 per share.

On March 31, 2023, the Company elected to settle \$92,970 in accrued interest due under the Company's previously issued convertible debentures through the issuance of 1,093,760 common shares of the Company, at a price of \$0.085 per share.

On June 30, 2023, the Company elected to settle \$92,970 in accrued interest due under the Company's previously issued convertible debentures through the issuance of 1,328,141 common shares of the Company, at a price of \$0.07 per share.

On October 2, 2023, the Company elected to settle \$92,868 in accrued interest due under the Company's previously issued convertible debentures through the issuance of 1,428,735 common shares of the Company, at a price of \$0.065 per share.

The fair value of the non-cash embedded derivative does not represent a future cash liability to the Company.

The debentures are secured with a first ranking charge against the assets of the Company, ranking paripassu with all other secured debenture holders.

Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements

As at December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Company had no off-balance sheet arrangements.

Critical Accounting Policies and Critical Accounting Estimates

Full disclosure of the Company's accounting policies and significant accounting judgments and estimation uncertainties in accordance with IFRS can be found in Note 3 of the Company's Annual Financial Statements.

Financial Instruments and Other Instruments

Financial Risk Management

The Company is exposed in varying degrees to a variety of financial instrument related risks. The Company's Board of Directors approves and monitors the risk management processes.

Credit Risk

Credit risk arises from the potential for non-performance by counterparties of contractual financial obligations. The Company's exposure to credit risk is on its cash and receivables. The Company has concentration of risk with respect to cash being held with one large Canadian financial institution. The Company's credit risk is mitigated by maintaining its financial liquid assets with highly reputable counterparties. The maximum exposure to credit risk is equal to the carrying value of the financial assets noted above.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company cannot meet its obligations as they fall due. The Company manages liquidity risk by preparing and maintaining cash forecasts, which illustrate cash spent to date and the Company's cash needs over the short term. Contractual undiscounted cash flow requirements for financial liabilities as at December 31, 2023 are included in the "Liquidity, Capital Resources and Going Concern" section of this MD&A.

The Company's ability to continue operations in the normal course of business is dependent on several factors, including the ability to secure additional financing.

Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair market value of the Company's financial instruments will significantly fluctuate due to changes in market prices. The value of the financial instruments can be affected by changes in interest rates, foreign exchange rates and equity and commodity prices. The Company is exposed to market risk in its cash and cash equivalents. The Company manages market risk by investing funds with a reputable financial institution that provides competitive rates of return.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the future cash flows from a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Company holds its cash in bank accounts that earn variable interest rates. A 1% change in interest rates would not have a significant impact on the Company's net income (loss) and comprehensive income (loss).

Fair value

Fair value is based on available public market information or, when such information is not available, estimated using present value techniques and assumptions concerning the amount and timing of future cash flows and discount rates which factor in the appropriate credit risk. The carrying values of cash, receivables, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, amounts due to related parties, advance royalty payable, and convertible debentures approximate their fair values due to their short-term nature. The embedded derivative liabilities included in the convertible debentures are measured under a level 3 hierarchy due to certain inputs that are not based on observable market data.

Related Party Transactions and Key Management Compensation

Key management compensation

Key management includes the Company's directors (Messrs. Steven Dean, Gordon Keep, Hon. John D. The amounts for Q4 2022 and FY 2022 included the compensation paid to the former Chief Financial Officer, Mr. Chris Batalha, who resigned effective December 31, 2022. ("Sinocan"), a company controlled by the Chief Executive Officer. As at December 31, 2023, the Company owed \$20,000 (2022: \$10,000) to Sinocan relating to unpaid consulting fees.

During the year ended December 31, 2023, the Company incurred corporate consulting fees of \$60,000 (2022: \$nil) to Timbavati Consult Inc. ("Timbavati"), a company controlled by the Chief Financial Officer. As at December 31, 2023, the Company owed \$60,000 (2022: \$nil) to Timbavati relating to unpaid consulting fees.

During the year ended December 31, 2023, the Company incurred corporate consulting fees of \$60,000 (2022: \$60,000) to Fiore Management & Advisory Corp. ("Fiore"), a company controlled by a director of the Company. As at December 31, 2023, the Company owed \$75,000 (2022: \$15,000) to Fiore relating to unpaid consulting fees

As at December 31, 2023, the Company owed \$87,500 (2022: \$57,500) in directors' fees to certain directors of the Company.

The Company was charged shared lease, overhead, and service costs by Artemis Gold Inc. ("Artemis"), a company with common management and directors. For the year ended December 31, 2023, the Company incurred \$19,842 (2022: \$27,957) in shared lease, overhead, and service costs. As at December 31, 2023, the Company owed \$89,440 (2022: \$69,598) to Artemis.

All related party transactions were made on terms equivalent to those that prevail in arm's length transactions.

As at the date of this report, there were 8,308,333 stock options and 214,285 common share purchase warrants outstanding.

As at the date of this MD&A, the Company also had the following convertible debentures outstanding:

- Series A Debentures \$760,000 convertible into units at a conversion price of \$0.10 per unit. The
 conversion price during the first year of the term was \$0.07 per unit, following which (on September
 26, 2023) increased to \$0.10 per unit for the remainder of the term. Each unit will consist of one
 common share of the Company and one common share purchase warrant of the Company, with
 each whole warrant entitling the holder to purchase one common share at a price of \$0.07 per
 common share and mature on September 26, 2027.
- Series B Debenture \$837,500 convertible into units at a conversion price of \$0.10 per unit. Each
 unit will be comprised of one common share and one share purchase warrant exercisable into one
 common share of the Company at a price of \$0.07 per common share and mature on November
 29, 2028.
- Series C Debentures \$1,557,548 convertible into units at a conversion price of \$0.19 per unit.
 Each unit will be comprised of one common share and one share purchase warrant exercisable into one common share of the Company at a price of \$0.19 per common share and mature on March 10, 2026.

• Series D Debentures - \$1,205,000 convertible into units at a conversion price of \$0.10 per unit. The conversion price during the first year of the term was \$0.07 per unit, following which (on September 26, 2023) increased to \$0.10 per unit for the remainder of the term. Each unit will consist of one common share of the Company and one common share purchase warrant of the Company, with each whole warrant entitling the holder to purchase one common Share at a price of \$0.07 per common Share and mature on September 26, 2027.

Subsequent Events

On January 2, 2024, the Company elected to settle an aggregate of \$92,652 in accrued interest payable under the Company's previously issued convertible debentures through the issuance of 1,544,185 common shares of the Company, at a price equal to \$0.06 per share.

On April 1, 2024, the Company elected to settle an aggregate of \$92,651 in accrued interest payable under the Company's previously issued convertible debentures through the issuance of 1,425,400 common shares of the Company, at a price of \$0.065 per share.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Company is in the business of acquiring, exploring and, if warranted, developing and exploiting natural resource properties. At present, the mineral properties owned by the Company are located in Québec, Canada. Due to the nature of the Company's proposed business and the present stage of exploration of its mineral properties (which are primarily exploration), the following risk factors, among others, will apply:

Going Concern

The Annual Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes that the Company will continue in operation for the foreseeable future and will be able to realize its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business. Factors that may impact the Company's ability to continue as a going concern are described in the *Liquidity, Capital Resources and Going Concern* section of this MD&A. The financial statements do not reflect the adjustments to the carrying values of assets and liabilities and the reported expenses and statement of financial position classifications that would be necessary were the going concern assumption deemed to be inappropriate, and these adjustments could be material.

Exploration and Development Risks

The exploration for and development of mineral deposits involves significant risks which even a combination of careful evaluation, experience and knowledge may not eliminate. Few properties that are explored are ultimately developed into producing mines. Major expenses may be required to locate and establish mineral reserves, to develop metallurgical processes and to construct mining and processing facilities at a particular site. It is impossible to ensure that the exploration or development programs planned by the Company will result in a profitable commercial mining operation. Whether a mineral deposit will be commercially viable depends on a number of factors, some of which are: the particular attributes of the deposit, such as quantity and quality of the minerals and proximity to infrastructure; mineral prices, which are highly cyclical; and government regulations, including regulations relating to prices, taxes, royalties, land tenure, land use, importing and exporting of minerals and environmental protection. The exact effect of these factors cannot be accurately predicted but could have a material adverse effect upon the Company's operations.

There is no certainty that the expenditures made by the Company toward the search and evaluation of minerals will result in discoveries of mineral resources, Mineral Reserves or any other mineral occurrences.

Political Stability and Government Regulation Risks

The operations of the Company are currently conducted in Québec, Canada. As such, the operations of the Company are exposed to various levels of political, economic and other risks and uncertainties. These risks and uncertainties include, but are not limited to: terrorism; extreme fluctuations in currency exchange rates; and changing political conditions, currency controls and governmental regulations.

Changes, if any, in mining or investment policies or shifts in political attitudes in Québec or Canada more broadly may adversely affect the operations or profitability of the Company. Operations may be affected in varying degrees by government regulations with respect to, but not limited to, restrictions on production, price controls, export controls, currency remittance, income taxes, expropriation of property, foreign investment, maintenance of claims, environmental legislation, land use, land claims of local people, water use and mine safety. Failure to comply strictly with applicable laws, regulations and local practices relating to mineral rights applications and tenure could result in loss, reduction or expropriation of entitlements, or the imposition of additional local or foreign parties as joint venture partners with carried or other interests.

The occurrence of these various factors and uncertainties cannot be accurately predicted and could have an adverse effect on the operations or profitability of the Company.

Insurance and Uninsured Risks

The business of the Company is subject to a number of risks and hazards in general, including adverse environmental conditions, industrial accidents, labor disputes, unusual or unexpected geological conditions, ground or slope failures, changes in the regulatory environment and natural phenomena such as inclement weather conditions, floods and earthquakes. Such occurrences could result in damage to mineral properties or facilities and equipment, personal injury or death, environmental damage to properties of the Company or others, delays in mining, monetary losses and possible legal liability.

Although the Company may maintain insurance to protect against certain risks in such amounts as it considers being reasonable, its insurance may not cover all the potential risks associated with a mining company's operations. The Company may also be unable to maintain insurance to cover these risks at economically feasible premiums. Insurance coverage may not be available or may not be adequate to cover any resulting liability. Moreover, insurance against risks such as environmental pollution or other hazards as a result of exploration and production is not generally available to the Company or to other companies in the mining industry on acceptable terms. The Company might also become subject to liability for pollution or other hazards which it may not be insured against or which the Company may elect not to insure against because of premium costs or other reasons. Losses from these events may cause the Company to incur significant costs that could have a material adverse effect upon its financial performance and results of operations.

Environmental Risks and Hazards

All phases of the Company's operations are subject to environmental regulation in the jurisdictions in which it operates. These regulations mandate, among other things, the maintenance of air and water quality standards and land reclamation. They also set forth limitations on the generation, transportation, storage and disposal of solid and hazardous waste. Environmental legislation is evolving in a manner that will require stricter standards and enforcement and involve increased fines and penalties for non-compliance, more stringent environmental assessments of proposed projects, and a heightened degree of responsibility for companies and their officers, directors and employees. There is no assurance that future changes in environmental regulation, if any, will not adversely affect the Company's operations. Environmental hazards may exist on properties in which the Company holds interests which are unknown to the Company at present and which have been caused by previous or existing owners or operators of the properties.

Failure to comply with applicable laws, regulations and permitting requirements may result in enforcement actions there under, including orders issued by regulatory or judicial authorities causing operations to cease or be curtailed, and may include corrective measures requiring capital expenditures, installation of additional equipment or remedial actions. Parties engaged in mining operations or in the exploration or development of mineral properties may be required to compensate those suffering loss or damage by reason of the mining activities and may have civil or criminal fines or penalties imposed for violations of applicable laws or regulations.

Amendments to current laws, regulations and permits governing operations and activities of mining and exploration companies, or more stringent implementation thereof, could have a material adverse impact on the Company and cause increases in exploration expenses, capital expenditures or require abandonment or delays in development of new mining properties.

Fluctuations in Metal Prices

The price of the common shares, and the financial results and exploration, development and mining activities of the Company, may in the future be significantly and adversely affected by declines in the prices of iron ore and other metals or minerals. The prices of iron ore and other metals or minerals fluctuate widely and are affected by numerous factors beyond the control of the Company such as the sale or purchase of commodities by various central banks and financial institutions, interest rates, exchange rates, inflation or deflation, fluctuations in the value of the United States dollar and other foreign currencies, global and regional supply and demand, the political and economic conditions and production costs of major mineral-producing countries throughout the world, the cost of substitutes, inventory levels and carrying charges. Future serious price declines in the market prices of iron ore or other metals or minerals could cause continued development of and commercial production from the properties in which the Company holds an interest to be impracticable. Depending on the prices of iron ore and other metals and minerals, cash flow from mining operations could not be sufficient and the Company may lose its interest in, or may be forced to sell, some of its properties. Future production from the Company's properties is dependent upon the prices of iron ore and other metals and minerals being adequate to make these properties economically viable.

In addition to adversely affecting the resource estimates of the Company and its financial condition, declining commodity prices can affect operations by requiring a reassessment of the feasibility of a particular project. Such a reassessment may be the result of a management decision or be required under financing arrangements related to a particular project. Even if a project is ultimately determined to be economically viable, the need to conduct such a reassessment may cause substantial delays or interrupt operations until the reassessment can be completed.

Key Personnel

The Company is dependent upon the services of key executives, including the directors of the Company and a small number of highly skilled and experienced executives and personnel. Due to the relatively small size of the Company, the loss of these persons or the inability of the Company to attract and retain additional highly-skilled employees may adversely affect its business and future operations.

Share Price Volatility and Liquidity

Publicly quoted securities are subject to a relatively high degree of price volatility. It may be anticipated that the quoted market for our shares will be subject to market trends generally, notwithstanding any potential success of us in creating sales and revenues. In addition, our shareholders may be unable to sell significant quantities of shares into the public trading markets without a significant reduction in the price of their shares, if at all.
